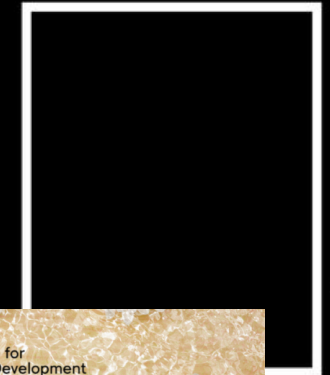

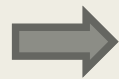
- The flagship blog of the ASAA

Approach to publishing in Asian Currents

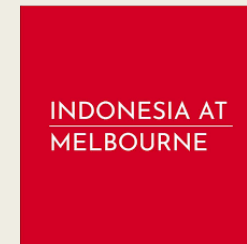
1. Identify the opportunities
2. Pitch your piece
3. Write it up
4. See it through

(1) Identify the opportunities

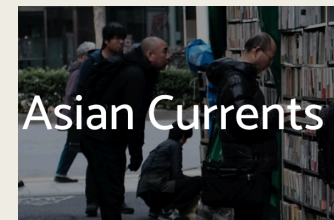
- Identify opportunities in your research



- Identify opportunities in the field



Asian studies



(2) Pitch your idea

- Title of the piece
- Purpose of the piece
- Relevance / timeliness
- Key points or findings
- A bit about the authors
- Timeline

(3) Write it up

- Work to a self-imposed deadline
- Use a hook in the introduction to current affairs
- Argue a point
- Adjust your writing style
- Use the publication guidelines
- Seek feedback

(4) See it through

- Submit
- Revise
- Edit
- Publish
- Promote
